7:30pm Welcome to members and guests: Bill Gemmell, Chair of meeting. Introduced himself and made apologies for Ms. Alice Hathorn. Outlined the agenda.

Presentation:

Yolandi Veermar is the founder of Wombat Rescue. In her presentation she outlined: Challenges facing wombats. Including:

 Mange, which is terminal. Not as common as people think, have a fragmented populations and numbers are decreasing. Reproduction is only once every two years. According to a CSIRO study, four million mammals are killed annually on our roads.

How you can help.

- As a driver you can drive to the conditions, slow down in wildlife zones. Stop and check pouches. Report injured wildlife so they receive assistance and move wildlife off the road.
- Facilitate open conversations with land holders, install wombat gates,
- You can volunteer your time to do treatment. Yolandi can offer training and items you may need to assist wombats.

Issues/sample questions raised by participants:

- Can safe corridors for wombats be created for them to cross the roads?
- Participant from the floor spoke highly of Yolandi's work and her experience of having found a wombat in her yard in Weston Creek.
- Are there any wombat hot spots in the Canberra area? A: Cooleman Ridge, Duffy area, Cotter Road.

8:00 pm Presentation by Kirsten Duncan from the CONSERVATION COUNCIL, ACT gas free project.

Presentation:

Conservation Council is quite a small organisation. This project was funded by the Government Zero Emissions Grant.

Kirsten Duncan referenced the ACT Climate Change Strategy 2019-2025.

100% renewable energy by 2020 was achieved in the ACT.

22% ACT emissions from transport.

Phase out fossil gas by 2045 is a goal in the Parliamentary and Governing Agreement.

Some features of the *Make the Switch* project:

- Switch from gas will help households to save money on bills.
- Is one way to take-action on climate change.
- Encourages households to switch their hot water, switch their heating, switch their cooking,
- Then you can close your gas account.
- Website has a calculator to compare running costs.
- You can download a free guide and action planner (copies available at the meeting).

Issues/sample questions raised by participants:

- Costs of running appliances.
- Complexities of gas reserves and fracking. Most of our gas is exported.
- Q: Concern about discontinuing gas. People perceive electricity as more expensive. Concern
 that this may result in an increase in wood burning as it is being seen as a cheaper option. A:
 wood heating may result in salvaging of logs which is an environmental issue. Air pollution is a
 problem in Canberra.
- Building structures the need for energy efficient standards.
- Q: How do you work out costs of setting up solar PV and /or batteries. A: This is dependent on your own personal circumstance.
- Q: Where will our electricity come from? A: Large scale installations such as solar, hydro and batteries will eventually be the source.

Community Connections Grants have been announced. It has a total of \$98 200 in funding. Community Gardens Grants are now open. \$10 000 per project available. Applications close 28 June. Gardens build strength and resilience.

Question asked about the care and maintenance of trees. A: We need to plant new trees, but we also need to look after the ones we have. Concerns can be passed on to City Services.

National Volunteering Week has just finished. As a result of COVID some groups, such as Landcare, are looking for volunteers.

Q: Ban on single use plastics. A: supporting the community so that appropriate utensils are available for use for people.
